Iron fabric if necessary

1. cut out doll torsos 2 at a time with wrong sides together leave a safty pin at bottom of doll to hold 2 parts together

(lay out 2 or 3 patterns on brown fabric to minimize waste) cut <u>with</u> warp or weft



 after faces have been painted: pin painted sides together INCLUDING HAIR RIBBON


between them

TAPE STICKING OUT FROM SEAM (when doll is turned no more than 5/8" of ribbon should stick out above head)


sew around head and torso TWICE leaving bottom open for stuffing

cut off tape and carefully clip where indicated by >

- turn right side out using tweezers or long nose pliers and chopstick
- stuff head and neck tightly with polyfill stuff arms lightly stuff torso moderatly
- 6. tuck in and machine sew bottom seam of torso


- 1. cut dresses two at a time using pinking shears Mix and Match fabrics
- 2. iron a <u>VERY NARROW</u> seam on each side of dress
- 3. fold over a ¾ inch "casing" at top and sew [Fig. 3]

- 4. Pin right sides together at neck.

 Mark with pin or pencil 2 1/2" up
 from pinked hem for armhole
- 5. machine stitch each side side from hem to mark or pin (leaves armhole)
- 6. use pinking shears to "correct" hem if necessary




DRESS DOLL


Thread 10" ribbon thru casings. Tie at one shoulder.

Turn dress right side out

Put on doll working arms thru armholes

Gather neckline, tie tightly at other shoulder





I keep the safty pin at bottom of doll through out the process

I use fabric paint that cleans up with water.

Use carboard dividers to seperate front from back of doll (paint can leak thru giving doll eyes in the back of her head)

Paint eyes on one side of each head by dipping a new pencil eraser in fabric paint and pressing it on to fabric (so the top of the eye is about midway up the head).

If you are right handed print the left eye first and do the right eye about 3/8" to the right of that.

HAIR

I have good luck using the "wooden print block". Taking a cheap foam brush you can dip it in a puddle of fabric paint and using a side to side swishing motions apply the paint to the block. Then press the block to the head with moderate pressure. Let dry overnight if possible.

FACE

Use a permanent ink marker to draw on eyebrows (scant like a childs) nostrils and smile. Give the eyes a tiny sparkle with dots of white fabric pain from the end of a toothpic. (Usually looks better if not dead center in eye.) Cockeyed? Correct with black magic marker.

Sleepy face side - do hair first - then fill in features
