Hygiene Kits

For our May Mini Mission, we collected items to assemble UMCOR Hygiene Kits that will be distributed to people in need when they are displaced from their homes due to natural disasters. We will be collecting the items needed until Sunday, June 2 and then meeting on Tuesday, June 4 at 10:30 am to assemble the kits. All are welcome to participate. The kits will be delivered to the New York Annual Conference in early June.

In addition to the items needed, they also request \$1.00 per kit for toothpaste and \$1.00 per kit for shipping. Monetary donations to cover these costs can be made by check payable to UMC Monroe with UMCOR Kits in the memo line and placed in the collection plate.

There is still time to make a donation – items can be placed in the Mini Missions Wagon in the narthex **until Sunday**, **June 2**. Please note that there are very specific requirements for some of the items and UMCOR asks that we strictly adhere to their guidelines for the items. Below is a list of the items collected to-date:



Our workday will begin on Monday at 7:00 am and continue thru 4:30 pm. Although we will be doing construction-related work, we will be spending time interacting with the family we've been assigned to serve. Friendships will be formed that will impact our lives, and lessons will be learned that will enrich our faith and character. Our evenings will be spent reflecting, sharing, playing, and singing with lights out at 11:00 pm.


